The amount of the contingency fund for this aspect of the grant (above baseline adoptions of healthy animals) is \$14,250.00. The number of animals addressed in this part of the project is the number of healthy dogs and cats euthanized at the SPCA and the Buffalo City Animal Shelter (483 cats and dogs). Agreement between the participating organizations to concentrate on removing healthy animals from the City Animal Shelter has been developed as the priority of the project for Year One. The SPCA is confident that the baseline of 131 healthy animals euthanized at the SPCA in 2007 will be eliminated and allow for the transfer of the remainder of the healthy animals from the City Shelter. The four Adoption Guarantee Organizations in this project are relatively small organizations run mostly by volunteer efforts with very limited resources. Increasing their adoptions will be somewhat more difficult for the AG organizations than for the SPCA because the SPCA has more infrastructure to design and promote adoptions activities.

Because the first year of the project is directed at ensuring that all healthy animals in Erie County are adopted, it is unlikely that many above baseline treatable dogs and cats will be transferred out of the City Animal Shelter to one of the partners. The above baseline 406 treatable animals targeted in the first year will be from Treatable animals at the SPCA that will be treated then adopted at the SPCA. The subsidy paid to the SPCA for these animals will amount to \$60,900. Within the first year's parameters there is no plan to require Adoption Guarantee Organizations or the SPCA to transfer in treatable or manageable animals from the City Animal Shelter. However, it is expected that from time to time there will be no healthy animals available to transfer out of the City Animal Shelter and the contingency fund addresses this by providing for 19 Treatable animals to be transferred out of the City Shelter to one of the other partners in the project.

33c) Procedure for Distributing the Adoption Subsidies and Contingency Fund

Partners in the project will be prepaid for the first quarter of the grant. Payment in the first month following the first quarter will reflect any adjustments needed to be made in the case of a partner not reaching a monthly goal during the first quarter. Monthly reports with documentation shall be required each month from each project partner. Based on reaching adoption goals or partial adoption goals funds will be paid from the grant to the individual organizations monthly. In the case where goals are exceeded over the period of the first year's grant, the contingency fund will be used to reimburse individual partners at the end of the year.

33d) Year One Programs and Services

1. Description of current activities:

The Animal Alliance of Western New York currently is working collaboratively to assist one another in saving animals' lives.

One activity is the transfer of HIV cats and relatively healthy FeLV cats from Animal Control and the ECSPCA to agencies equipped with housing or foster care to meet the needs of these cats. The ECSPCA provides ongoing financial support to agencies accepting these cats. (Approximately 45 per year saved)

Because the ECSPCA is the only agency with veterinarians on staff, other agencies, including Animal Control, will routinely transfer the more expensive cases of treatable animals to the SPCA for treatment. There is no charge to the smaller agency (Approximately 15 per year).

All agencies are involved in receiving animals from animal control, most importantly the Buffalo City Animal Shelter. In addition to the animals accepted by the partners, the SPCA also accepts stray dogs and cats held by small municipalities at the end of the state prescribed holding time. (Approximately 500 per year).

ECSPCA routinely provides other agencies with surplus equipment, for instance, cages, crates, medical supplies, etc. that are donated to the SPCA.

All agencies communicate on an email list with particular animal problems daily. For instance, today's discussion involves a friendly mother stray cat and her four kittens at the University of Buffalo, and what agency has room to take them. Two of the five agencies responded positively within an hour to this request. (Approximately one case per week)

The ECSPCA has made its surgical suite available for feral cat spays and neuters and low income spays and neuters for over five years on Saturdays and Sundays. All Alliance members have helped to subsidize the costs of these surgeries. As a result of the Alliance working together a new agency has emerged, Operation Pets, a Spay/Neuter facility available for low-income people, member agencies, and feral cat caretakers, which opened for business August 20, 2008.

The Alliance meets monthly to discuss ongoing initiatives and new initiatives.

The Alliance has had its first successful fundraiser, with all donations going to Operation Pets for use in operating funds.

Together the Alliance Members have worked on the issues of feral cats. One very important result was that the ECSPCA will no longer accept healthy feral cats for euthanasia and with the other Alliance members works diligently to see these same animals serviced through a TNR program. (Approximately 300 per year)

In 2008 the SPCA operated a cat adoption center at the area's largest mall from August until December 2008. 550 cats were saved by this effort.

2. Description of Future Activities

ADOPTION

The Cat Adoption Center at the area's largest mall will be replicated again in 2009 with a few changes. The plan is to open the adoption center in June 2009 and remain open year round. All partners in the Project will have space for the adoption of their cats. The SPCA will be responsible for the overall running of the adoption center and the other partners have agreed to provide a portion of the volunteers needed to assist staff.

The mall adoption center is 1400 square feet of space. In the center there will be 15 cat condos, each measuring 30" X 30"X 70". Each condo has 5 layers of living space. The adoption guarantee partners and the City Shelter will each have their own cat condo. One, two, or even three cats could live comfortable in each condo. Based on previous experience at the mall in 2008 we expect each organization to be able to easily exceed their above baseline target adoptions at the Mall location. Projections, based on the results of last year's trial run at the Mall, for adoptions of cats is between 1500 and 2000 a year at the Mall location with an above baseline target of 799

The SPCA has paid all of the expenses for set up, the purchase of all cat condos, and will cover most of costs of the Mall operation. A small portion of project funding (\$27,770) will be used to defray the monthly rental fees. (AB Adoption Goal 799 cats)

Special promotions of pit-bull adoptions, including reduced adoption fees and free training will be added to the adoption efforts of the Partner groups. Web site information and stories about successful pit-bull adoptions, radio and television promotion on SPCA regular spots of exceptional pit-bulls, and other media directed promotions of healthy pit-bulls will be ongoing initiatives. (AB Adoption goal 24 dogs)

Two group adoption events will be held. One will be in conjunction with Camp Bow Wow, a national chain of dog day care and boarding. This event, *Canine's Cupid*, will be advertised by camp Bow Wow and is held on Valentines Day. (AB Adoption Goal 16 dogs)

The second adoption event will be held in honor of Maddie. It will be promoted as Maddie's Adoption Event and will be held during the summer months when the Partner organizations will need the most help. (AB Adoption Goal 16 cats and dogs)

The announcement in November concerning Maddie's Fund, the Humane Society of the United States and the Ad Council's groundbreaking campaign to promote U.S. Shelter Pet Adoptions will also increase the number of adoptions at Partner agencies. (AB Adoption Goal 34 cats and dogs)

With these adoption promotions the goal of 889 Above Baseline Adoptions should be achieved.

PREVENTION

With the opening of Operation Pets in August, low cost surgery is available for low-income families, all local rescue groups, and for feral cat caretakers. At the end of 2008, the clinic had sterilized 2141 cats and dogs. Approximately 80% of the sterilization surgeries were done on cats. In 2009 target populations of animals will be sought for sterilization. Pit bulls and cats owned by low-income families

(individuals), and feral cats are the focus of targeted sterilization efforts of Operation Pets. This targeted sterilization will impact the number of surplus animals that are problematic to our community, cats and pit bulls.

Further, with the opening of Operation Pets, the SPCA's surgical suite can be put to use caring for more injured or ill animals, and to spay and neuter additional animals that will have the opportunity for adoption in 2009. Other Alliance members do not have a veterinary staff and have utilized private practice veterinarians for their spay/neuter needs. While there is some discount provided to these groups, being able to utilize Operation Pets for spays and neuters will save a substantial amount of money for these groups. These funds that are saved will allow groups to use their resources in other ways that can directly impact the number of animals that they are able to serve.

For many years we have worked on the issue of cat overpopulation through a multi-tiered plan outlined in the Preliminary Application to Maddie's Fund. Since 2001 we have seen a decrease in the number of cats surrendered to the SPCA of 37%. The plan continues to benefit this population with totals in 2008 of cat intake showing an additional decrease of 5% over the previous year. With numbers decreasing in terms of "surplus" animals, more can be done for the individual homeless animal, whether it is the ability to hold the animal for adoption for increased periods of time, reduce overcrowding at shelters, or have the means to treat more sick animals, this reduction in intake will (and currently does) mean more animals saved each year.

CLARIFICATION

There are two areas for which the Partners believe further clarification is needed to work on the goals of the Maddie's Fund of finding all healthy and treatable animals homes:

1. Currently in the statistics provided for this grant 258 healthy dogs are listed as euthanized at the Buffalo Animal Shelter. For the most part these dogs are unevaluated pit-bull type dogs. Each Partner organization currently struggles to find healthy pit-bulls homes. Little effort has been made to establish more proactive ways to do this. It is clear that the first thing that must be done to is to make certain that all dogs in this community receive behavioral assessment prior to adoption. In doing so a truer number will emerge in terms of healthy euthanasia, treatable euthanasia and unhealthy/untreatable euthanasia of animals. Additionally this will assist in helping not only the healthy animals but the treatable as well. In the first year's budget money will be set aside to employ an individual trained to do proper assessments of all the dogs at the Buffalo Animal Shelter. *(See budget line item for evaluator)*
2. While cats enjoy the number one spot as American pets it is still very clear that they remain second-hand animals. Survey after survey indicates that cats receive less veterinary care and are more often surrendered to shelters for a variety of reasons than dogs for the same reasons. The stray (lost) cat is overlooked in our society as an animal capable of taking care of itself leading to the poor redemption levels of cats from shelters throughout the country. Negative stereotypical ideas concerning cats remain the norm. In the first year of the project the plan is to do market research to identify problems associated with cats and to develop strategies to market directly to these issues. The SPCA has secured \$25,000 in cat directed marketing services from a prominent local advertising firm, to be used after the market research is completed. *(See budget line item for market research)*

The Erie County community has a long tradition of concern and care of animals. The community has anxiously awaited the time when the adoption of homeless animals can be guaranteed. At this time there has been no public announcement that a Maddie’s Fund Community Grant has been applied for. Strategically it is believed that the time for an announcement is at the time that funding is secured.

SPCA

A great deal of excitement will be generated by this announcement and what it means for this community. Many potential donors have decided not to support the work of the SPCA until which time it can say that it is a “no kill” organization. With a plan in place it is expected that many new donors will come forward.

The ECSPCA will take advantage of the “Halo Effect” following the announcement of the Maddie’s Fund grant to the community and include with their next direct mail piece a request for an additional gift of \$25 or more to be set aside and restricted for future funding of the efforts begun through the Maddie’s Fund. The SPCA would expect approximately 6200 donors from this mailing and projects that 25% will include the additional gift. That would amount to 1550 donors @ \$25 equaling \$38,750. (Costs: \$0.15/dollar raised or \$5,812)

Buffalo Humane

Buffalo Humane will conduct a single dedicated annual fundraising event for the Maddie’s Fund grant. Typically, the first holding of such an event can be expected to garner approximately \$2,000, and tends to build over the first few years. Buffalo Humane’s donor base draws significantly on the university community of the State University of New York at Buffalo, which boasts over 27,000 students and employs 20,000 area residents. The University community has traditionally rallied in support of special

initiatives of all kinds, particularly those that promote state-of-the-art approaches to regional issues.
(Cost: \$250.00)

Buffalo Humane Fund Raising Goal : \$2,000

HEART

To accommodate increased intake and raise additional funds HEART will soon offer a Pay Pal Account on their website to assist in fundraising activities. Additionally the website will be redeveloped to make it more user friendly, more educational, and a better tool to cultivate donors. A special web appeal to donors for funds to be set aside for future funding will be added to HEART's fundraising schedule.

(Costs \$.065/dollar raised or \$143.00)

Second Chance

Second Chance plans to increase its fundraising activities to include events or mailings restricted to fundraising for future needs to maintain the work of Maddie's Fund. (Costs \$.065/dollar raised or \$143.00) *Second Chance Fund Raising Goal : \$2,200*

Ten Lives Club

Ten Lives Club mails 2,000 newsletters approximately 6 times per year to volunteers and supporters. One issue will be entirely dedicated to highlighting Maddie and her legacy of saving animal's lives. In addition to this communication tool, Ten Lives utilizes a very active e-newsletter, TLC Copy Cat that provides numerous opportunities for fundraising. Both of these forms of communication will be utilized to raise additional funds to be set aside for future expenses. (Costs \$.065/dollar raised or \$143.00)

Ten Lives Fund Raising Goal: \$2,200

Joint Fund Raising

The Alliance will hold a fund raising event with the goal of \$2,500 to be set aside for future funding. Last year's event was a Tatoo-A-Thon at a local tattoo parlor. Paw prints were tattooed for \$20 per paw print. A similar event is planned. (Cost: \$150 for flyers/posters)

Joint Fund Raising Goal: \$2,500

The Animal Alliance of Western New York will establish a signature event to be run annually with a goal of raising minimally \$30,000 annually towards funding the goals of Maddie's Pet Rescue Project in Erie County, NY once the grant is over. Initially the costs of this event will run fairly high but as the event matures costs will be expected to go down and profits to go up. (Cost: \$8,500.00)

35. MADDIE RECOGNITION

The Animal Alliance of Western New York is comprised of several types of animal welfare organizations, those that shelter homeless animals, animal control agencies, an animal rights organization, and booster organizations to benefit animals at the Buffalo City Animal shelter. The entire membership embraces this application for support from Maddie's Fund.

The Alliance will provide recognition to Maddie through its website, through press releases and letters to the editors of local papers. The Alliance is fortunate to have a public relations committee headed by very competent public relations professionals.

Each organization in the project will provide ongoing recognition to Maddie in their communications network of newsletters, email alerts, electronic newsletters to their donors and supporters.

Erie County SPCA

The Erie County SPCA enjoys excellent media relationships with Buffalo's three network affiliates. Each cover SPCA events and stories regularly and the CBS affiliate provides a spot on the noon news each week for the SPCA to show a pet and make announcements. Each affiliate's website has a link to the SPCA's website.

The public relations director of the SPCA has four regular weekly spots on four radio stations that cover the majority of the demographics of this community. Each radio and television station currently involved with the SPCA has links to the SPCA's website.

The Buffalo News covers SPCA stories and events regularly as do the rest of the local newspapers.

A web page will be developed on the SPCA's website www.yourspca.org, With the history of Maddie's Fund, the story of Maddie, and coverage of Maddie's Pet Rescue Project in Erie County, NY through monthly updates on the Projects goals. This process to engage the public in Maddie's Project will assist all of the agencies in meeting their goals through adoption and fund raising.

On average the SPCA's website receives 240,000 page views per month and 18,000 unique visitors monthly. The SPCA has a mailing list of 30,000, an email list of 4,400 individuals. All of these media opportunities and mailing opportunities are available for recognition of Maddie.

The SPCA will display the Maddie's Fund Logo wherever appropriate. In particular one of the attractive glass front kennels in the adoption area of the SPCA will feature the Maddie's Fund logo and Maddie's story for the 40,000+ visitors to the SPCA annually.

Buffalo Humane

Buffalo Humane's base of support is comprised of those involved in the University of New York at Buffalo, students, faculty and staff. This academic setting provides unique opportunities for Maddie's recognition. Buffalo Humane would wish to provide materials to students on the history of Maddie and Maddie's Fund as well as information on the impact Maddie's Fund has had on community collaborations in saving the lives of homeless animals. Students could prepare papers, speeches, etc., for

classes at the University, an opportunity that reaches not only the area of this grant but can spread to other areas of the state and country as students graduate and move on.

HEART

Nearly 25 years ago HEART was formed as a no-kill organization to rescue and assist the area's homeless animal population. At a time when no-kill was deemed an idealistic dream this group came together and has persevered through a quarter of a century. In recognition of HEART's efforts a silver anniversary celebration is planned. Because Maddie's Fund and HEART have shared core values this celebration will allow matchless opportunities to recognize Maddie, as well as the movement throughout the country that Maddie's legacy has provided. Preparation is underway for PSA's, billboards, and press releases for this celebration that will lend themselves to Maddie recognition.

HEART is featured frequently in area newspapers and also enjoys a weekly radio show. These media opportunities will provide many options for Maddie recognition. HEART will display the Maddie's Fund logo at their storefront adoption center, located in Hamburg, NY.

Second Chance

Second Chance will provide recognition to Maddie through its website, newsletter, and tabling materials at special events and fundraisers.

Ten Lives Club

Ten Lives Club will utilize their newsletters, both regular and electronic, to recognize Maddie. One issue will be dedicated to her memory and legacy. At the Ten Lives shelter signage will be displayed in accordance with any Maddie's Fund guidelines.

Joint Efforts

Currently the SPCA has "Pet of the Week" segments on the local CBS and NBC affiliates as well as "Pet of the Week" segments on a variety of radio stations covering many of the population dynamics of this community. The Buffalo City Animal shelter enjoys a "pet of the Week" segment on the ABC affiliate. The Time Warner Cable Company that services the cable television needs of Erie County plans to begin a 24 hour news station soon. Jointly we will provide a proposal to Time Warner for the development of a "Maddie's Pet of the Week" segment to air during a prime time for that station. This will be a shared spot with all Partners in the Project.

Budget Notes

1. The Project Coordinator will be responsible for all aspects of coordinating the goals and outcomes of the grant, including assistance with fund raising and adoption events, collecting data, payment of subsidies to agencies, reporting to Maddie’s Fund, and working on the development of strategies and plans.
2. The Project Adoption Coordinator will be responsible to oversee and plan all adoption events associated with the Maddie’s grant. Additionally the Adoption Coordinator will oversee the Mall Adoption Center and work closely with the participating Maddie’s partners.
3. Market research dollars will be used to identify attitudes towards cats in the community in order to market cats more effectively going forward. The SPCA has secured \$25,000 in cat directed marketing services from a prominent local advertising firm, to be used after the market research is completed.
4. The budget for one year’s operation of the adoption center at the Mall is \$225,000. This includes rent, staffing, some utilities expense, insurance, telephone, office supplies, etc. The Maddie’s Pet Project Budget amount of \$27,770 for Mall Expense will be used to defray rental fees.

37. ANIMAL WELFARE ISSUES

Feral Cats: Erie County SPCA held a summit on feral cats approximately six years ago, bringing together all animal welfare groups, government officials, and local veterinarians. Speakers from around the country with exceptional programs for feral cats in place were invited to share their experiences with Erie County groups.

From this summit a group, Feral Cat Focus, was formed to establish more TNR, more sterilization opportunities and more education for the public concerning feral cats.

Feral Cat Focus and the SPCA collaborated to sterilize as many feral cats as was possible for several years. During this time the Animal Alliance of Western New York was formed to bring together animal welfare groups to work together and further the welfare of animals in the community. One project that was developed was Operation Pets, a sterilization clinic for low-income individual’s pets, as well as feral cats. Feral cats will now be sterilized at Operation Pets.

All member groups of the Alliance support TNR and the education of the public concerning feral cats.

Pit Bulls: As is the case with most communities, the number of homeless pit bulls is proportionally larger in Erie County than any other breed of dogs. Add to this, those that are healthy are not as easily placed as other breeds.

The City of Buffalo Animal Shelter has the highest proportion of pit bulls of any of the agencies in Erie County. While as many as possible are transferred to the SPCA and the Adoption Guarantee organizations, currently there are more needing adoption than there are resources to save them.

Proposed Changes: New York State is one of the few states in the country that does not mandate animal control. Only dog control is statutorily required in New York. Currently the SPCA is working with local state legislators to update NYS laws to require training for officers as well as bring other animals into the control laws of New York.

We are also in the process of investigating a policy of feral cat colonies maintained through the Health Department as a means of rodent control. The future of this particular policy is uncertain but the conversation is one that is important as we work towards a truly collaborative community.
