
Why is foster care needed?

- Underage animals need extra



Dogs Incoming vs. Adoptions, RTO's & Transfers 2 007



- Organize
 - Excel spreadsheet/Shelter buddy software
- Application/Interview/Homevisit
 - Respond IMMEDIATELY, give them an animal IMMEDIATELY!!!
 - Home visit versus interview
 - Listen and learn information to manage of fosters
 - Flexibility
- Contract
 - Should include any legal requirements
 - Adequate Care
 - Non-conviction
 - Liability waivers and release
 - Ownership

Train and teach

Train

- Neonatals
- Giving meds
- Caring for injured animals and socializing/modifying behavior
- Review of applicants
- Adoption from home

Educate on expectations

- Risk to other pets
- Common illnesses, risk of death
- Medical treatments given and needed

Empathize and energize

- De helpful, understanding, non-judgmental and solutions oriented
- Talk to fosters what do they need
- Unassisted death and euthanasia be compassionate
 - Fosters present during euthanasia
 - Fosters visiting sick animals

- On a daily basis
- Foster Party Awards
 - Big Dog
 - Neonatal
 - Cootie Award
 - Family Foster (baby pool)
 - Full House (air freshener)
 - Best Junior Fosters

Foster Follies

- No adoption by foster
- Fosters cannot approve adopters or adopt out of home
- Limits
 - number of animals in a foster home
 - organization total animals fostered at point in time
- Medical treatment req'd at organization
- Fenced in yards/landlord approval
- Vaccine history of owned animals



- Contagious disease in foster home
 - Ringworm, skin conditions, parvo
- Adoption restrictions imposed by fosters
- Unexpected medical bills
- 🔁 Euthanasia/death -
 - Need to go the extra mile/only serious medical/behavioral





- Intake is cyclical, especially with respect to cats
- Adoption, customer service and marketing programs take time to catch up to the intake
- Over the hump in 2007
