

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











- In one of our six shelters we have an at home room and volunteers take shy dogs in there and work with them out of the kennel environment. It has really helped get those dogs adopted.
- Learning Dog COnference
- Mike Norris, again, main person to teach.
- Our behavior (staff) manager has trained several volunteers to teach a 1.5 hour class in body language and general tips for handling scared dogs in the shelter. It is mandatory before handling dogs with orange collars (scared dogs). We also have a scared dog team (BOO Dawgz) of volunteers who do ongoing training for volunteers who want to work with scared dogs and fosters of scared dogs as well as behavior staff who work with dogs in the shelter and provide support for fosters and adopters as well. We intend to make additional videos for fosters and adopters.
- Our behavior department evaluates and creates plans for individual dogs.



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Comment:

- Actually staff is trained by management and on the job. Our Volunteers are trainied by a volunteer program that we have in place where we oay a Dog behaviorist for this training.
- Both groups get similar trainings but modified depending on what they are allowed to do
- Don't do enough to train volunteers yet re: shy dogs
- Employees are trained on the job. Volunteers attend a structured orientation.
- Generally do not have volunteers interact with animals if their is a possibility of them getting bit
- It's hit or miss, no specific policy in effect or knowledegable staff
- It's hit or miss, no specific policy in effect or knowledgable staff
- Mike speaks individually to volunteers re:dog behavior.
- Only 1 paid staff (the ED)
- Orient volunteers; no further training; no formal staff training other than for Officers
- Shelter employee's handled separately than volunteers.
- Some of the same materials overlap, but others we focus on just staff.
- Some of the same, but less in-depth for volunteers. Volunteers learn about the areas they are interested in.
- Some staff receives more in depth training
- Some the same, some different
- staff have been local PD. Shape and make up of organization has changed. Is a private/org with city connections.
- staff train the volunteers
- Staff training protocols include information for staff-only procedures, and for dogs volunteers aren't permitted to handle
- Training process is a bit different with staff/volunteers, but the content is essentially the same.
- Volunteers are not handling the dog until they are suitable for adoption, so staff are handling the more fearful ones.
- · Volunteers nor staff receive training materials or training protocols besides verbal 'pass-down' communication
- Volunteers receive one initial group orientation only
- Volunteers work with local trainers.
- we currently have not sent volunteers to external training, we have varying levels of volunteers and will only allow volunteers with more training to handle specific dogs (ie fearful, reactive, etc)
- We do the same training for both groups but our volunteers do more hands on work with our shy dogs
- We have a paid professional, three professional volunteers, one knowledgeable non-professional, and inmates. We don't train volunteers, but we all help train inmates.
- We have different level of volunteers and depending on training depends on what dogs with issues they work with we have an improving adoptability program for our volunteers
- We have volunteers filling different roles and only some are specially trained/allowed to work with our severely fearful dogs.
- We try to be consistent, but with so many volunteers and the lack of a volunteer coordinator, we cannot guarantee that information and training is delivered consistently.
- We use a scaled down explanation for volunteers because we don't have many long-term volunteers-usually have them ignore shy dogs and interact with others, utilize them for hand-feeding and target work, reading to dogs
- We use similar materials tailored to their roles
- We would like to but currently there is only volunteer training
- Yes for safety and handling but vols do not assess temp




Volunteer Training









- We try to get shy dogs to foster homes as soon as foster space and an experienced foster becomes available.







Q39: Does your organization have a structured plan for housing, interaction with, and enrichment for shy dogs in a shelter or foster home? Answered: 327 Skipped: 89






